<b>Delaware</b>	Civil penalty of \$1,000 to \$10,000 per day.	Liable for cleanup costs.	A person, determined by the secretary to be responsible, shall immediately undertake to remove oil pollution.  Responsible parties shall take measures for prompt control, containment, and removal of the release.
<b>Florida</b>	Civil and criminal penalties.	Liable for cleanup costs.	Immediate notice.  Within 24 hours of the discovery, in writing or electronic format
<b>Illinois</b>	N/A	Liable for cleanup costs.  A responsible party is liable for removal costs and damages.	Immediate notice.
<b>Maryland</b>	Criminal penalties: misdemeanors and fines of up to \$50,000 per day, or two years of imprisonment, or both; civil fines of up to \$25,000 per offense per day.	Liable for cost of labor, equipment operation, and material necessary to eliminate the residue of oil spillage, and cost for restoring the damaged area.  Liable for site rehabilitation cost.	Immediate notice.  Notice to Department of the Environment within two hours.
<b>New Jersey</b>	Civil penalty of not more than \$50,000 per violation per day.	Liable for cost of cleanup and removal.	Immediate notice.  The owner or operator shall report to the Department of Environmental Protection the source and cause of the confirmed release on a form found on the department's website.
<b>New York</b>	Maximum penalty of \$25,000 per day.  Penalty for spilling bulk liquids.	Any person who has discharged petroleum shall be strictly liable, without regard to fault, for all cleanup and removal costs.  The commissioner of the Department of Environmental Conservation is liable for all cost for cleanup and removal, including the reasonable costs of equipment usage and the salaries and overhead of the operators	Immediate notice, but in no case later than 2 hours after discharge.  Within 24 hours of detection.
<b>Pennsylvania</b>	Civil and criminal penalties.	A person who causes the release of hazardous material shall be liable for the response costs incurred by a certified hazardous material response team or a supporting paid or volunteer emergency service organization, or both.  A responsible party shall be liable for any removal costs, damages, or corrective actions.	Immediate notice to the Pennsylvania Emergency Management Agency response number and to the county office designated and acting as the emergency response coordinator for the local committee.  The owner or operator shall immediately notify the county emergency department upon the occurrence of a release but no later than 2 hours if the release enters a water supply, otherwise within 24 hours.
